### Equity Week Opening Keynote: Cultivating Community with Eric K. Ward



Eric K. Ward is a leading civil rights strategist and Executive Vice President of Race Forward, dedicated to dismantling systemic racism and combating authoritarianism and organized hate, including antisemitism. Raised in Southern California, his experiences as a Black punk rocker shaped his commitment to social justice and grassroots activism, which he honed from 1989 to 2003 across the Pacific Northwest and Mountain West. Mr. Ward cofounded #CultureGuard to help subcultures reclaim their narratives and serves

on several boards, including the Proteus Fund and Auburn Theological Seminary. As Board Chair of States at the Core (STAC), he promotes local democracy and civic engagement.

The only American awarded the Civil Courage Prize, he has transformed national discussions on race, antisemitism, and democracy. His work is featured in documentaries like *Viral*: *Antisemitism in Four Mutations* and *We've Been Here Before*, and his writings challenge white nationalism and highlight the power of grassroots activism. Mr. Ward continues to inspire action toward a more just and inclusive society.

## Leadership and Advocacy for Inclusive Practices: How to Be an Agent of Change Within Your Community



Jason Green is a Maryland-based business executive, board advisor, and early-stage investor focused on the future of work, economic opportunity, and mobility. In 2013, he co-founded SkillSmart, an award-winning platform that connects employers, job seekers, and education providers, enabling diverse communities to equitably benefit from over \$100B in economic development. He is also Executive-in-Residence at Zeal Capital Partners, a DC-based inclusive investing™ venture firm addressing health, skills, and

wealth gaps.

Previously, Jason served as Associate Counsel to President Barack Obama, advising on legal, economic, and domestic policy, particularly in response to the Great Recession, focusing on workforce retraining and economic development strategies. Earlier, he was National Voter Registration Director for Obama's 2008 campaign, leading the 50-state Vote for Change initiative, and has managed field operations for several political campaigns.

The son of a preacher and a public school teacher, Jason values community engagement and serves on various boards, including chairing the Montgomery County Remembrance and

Reconciliation Commission. He directed and co-produced *Finding Fellowship*, an award-winning PBS documentary on the unification of three racially segregated churches in the 1960s DC region. A TEDx speaker, he has been featured on Bloomberg News, MSNBC, and NPR discussing workforce trends, politics, and the economy. Jason is a graduate of Washington University in St. Louis and earned a law degree from Yale Law School.
